Letter from the president

I am proud to report that 2023 was a year of accomplishment for Henry Ford Jackson Hospital (HFJH). Our most significant achievement was improving access to care for all community members—including those yet to be born.

In January, our Maternal Fetal Medicine team performed its first fetal echocardiogram. This remarkable non-invasive test detects heart conditions in the fetal stage, usually between 18 to 24 weeks of pregnancy. We are excited to offer this service to at-risk expectant mothers close to home, addressing heart conditions, which are among the most common birth defects.

To help new mothers and give the best start in life to their newborns, we opened the Henry Ford Milk Bank – Jackson last June. Breast milk is considered the nutritional gold standard by the World Health Organization. But sometimes mothers have a low milk supply, or infants are unable to breastfeed for other reasons. The Milk Bank provides safe, rigorously tested and pasteurized donor milk to help lower the baby's risk of allergies, obesity, asthma, type 1 diabetes and sudden infant death syndrome.

In a time of national physician shortages, we enhanced access to care for the communities we serve by welcoming 11 new specialist providers in high-demand areas. These include obstetrics and gynecology, family medicine, child behavioral health, orthopedics and sports medicine, otolaryngology (ENT) and neurology. Lastly, I would like to thank our team and community for a successful Pink Ball. Together with the generous endowment from the Al Glick Foundation, we are able to build the next generation of healthcare providers. The largest donation in our organization's history, these funds will help ensure our community is cared for as we build a pipeline of professionals who have a passion for making a difference.

All of these achievements would not have been possible without the dedication of our entire team and support from our community. I am truly grateful to all of you for helping make HFJH the best it can be.

Growing the pipeline

Henry Ford Jackson Hospital is continually preparing for future staffing needs, which is critical in light of a nationwide shortage of healthcare providers. We are working to make healthcare career education and training more accessible in partnership with Jackson College, the Jackson Area Career Center, Grand Valley State University, Michigan Works!, the Martin Luther King Jr. Recreation Center, the P.A.C.T. Program and other community organizations.

We are currently prioritizing in-demand roles such as nurses, nursing assistants, medical assistants, radiology technicians and surgical technicians. For example, Jackson College is helping to fill a growing need by offering surgical technologist certification. Additionally, the Career Center's health technician program prepares students to apply for medical assistant and nursing assistant positions at HFJH. The Career Center also helps prepare medical assistants and nursing assistants who are studying to become registered nurses.

Together, we are opening career opportunities for local young people who may not have envisioned a future in healthcare—as well as those seeking a career change or reentering the workforce after raising a family.

daVinci Robot Day – Mohan Kulkarni, M.D., thoracic surgeon and internationally recognized expert in robot-assisted surgery, hosted the Northwest High School Robotics Club for a hands-on demonstration of the daVinci robotic surgical system to inspire students towards a career in healthcare.

Diversity, equity, inclusion and social justice

Identifying healthcare inequities

Henry Ford Jackson Hospital recognizes that a community cannot be truly healthy until every community member has access to quality healthcare. We continually strive to identify and resolve healthcare inequities. According to the Jackson County Infant Mortality data, in 2021–2022, our community's black and brown babies died at a rate of 4-6 times greater than our white babies. We are seeing evidence of a decrease in these rates in our community, however there is still an urgency to combat these racial disparities and ensure that every baby has the equitable opportunity to reach their first birthday.

Breaking down barriers

Micalah Webster, HFJH's director of community health equity & social impact, is building connections with local leaders of businesses, non-profits, grassroot organizations, and community groups to determine how best to meet the needs of the community and what equity in action looks like when it comes to delivering care and standing up resources. In 2023, Micalah and her team gathered input from more than 400 community members regarding health services, community needs, and what they want to see from HFJH in the future. This data informed the Health Equity Transformation Assessment that will be used to create the roadmap for future services, resources, activities. and how we measure success. Some next steps include collaborating with community members and other stakeholders to co-design what our future priorities and action plans look like to deliver on the promise of health equity. Additionally, internal tactical action plan teams will be created to have an accountable group of people focus on the steps to drive changes forward. Throughout the process, the cycle of feedback and review will continue to ensure we are operating from a standpoint of continuous improvement and being responsive and adaptive to the community needs.

Building trust, raising

Another important factor in eliminating healthcare inequities is building trust with under-served populations in our community. HFJH's Director of Community Engagement Teshna Thomas advocates for those who face barriers to receiving the care they need. To raise awareness about available health services and resources, Teshna and other HFJH team members participated in 2023 diversity-focused community events—from The Black Food Sovereignty Festival and the Habitat for Humanity Veterans Build to the Jackson Pride Fest and the Special Olympics Kayaking Tournament. "We want every community member to know quality healthcare is available to them through HFJH, and that they will be welcomed and respected here," says Teshna.

Philanthropy

Hospice Endowment Fund



A \$2.4M gift was given to create the Henry Ford Jackson Hospice Endowment Fund. This fund will provide a consistent revenue stream, supporting services and programs through all hospice care delivery avenues. We are committed to providing compassionate, dignified end-of-life care for all who need it, in all settings, regardless of a patient's ability to pay.

Cancer Center expansion

Thanks to many generous donors in 2023, the Gayle M. Jacob Cancer Center will expand its space and scope of services in 2024. Added space will house six new infusion chairs, a high-risk breast clinic, supportive oncology services and more. Naming opportunities in the expanding space are available.


